The greenhouse, however, needs regular checks in winter to ensure the heater is working and to monitor plants which need watering. One of those is a

stunning Justicia floribunda, or Brazilian fuchsia. Mine is very floriferous at the moment. Echeveria 'Red Sea Monster' is true to its name and wants to grow big! Its flower stems are tall and crowned with red/dark pink blooms on the ends. It's a real favourite of mine.

Euphorbia characias looks pretty, even flowerless with frozen leaves. It certainly makes a dramatic feature plant with its long stems clothed in blue-grey foliage, which is handsome all year. It prefers shelter from wind but mine does take a battering but still survives.



One of the recycled, rusty metal sculptures in the beach garden is a bird bath made from metal cogs with an old bundt cake pan on top to hold the water. The birds love it but it's so hard to keep it from freezing over in the winter.

The greenhouse needs

Inthe house. I've had great success with a poinsettia. I bought it in December and then I placed it in the lounge out of direct sunlight and watered it only when the compost dried out. Result: it's still almost as good



as the day I bought it, so I'm very pleased. Long may it last!
